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
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
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LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2023 has shown us that our NY state hop breeding program is real, and it needs our support. 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ALTA VISTA FARM HOPS

Alta Vista Farm was established in the mid-1700's and the original farmhouse still stands today. The current farmhouse, the big barn and other buildings, were built in the mid to late 180

built in the mid to late 1800s. The last commercial farming operation, a dairy farm, ceased operations in the 1960s.

The Fink family bought Alta Vista Farm in 1975 and learned that their farm was at the heart of the 19th century American hop growing industry. The breweries that made New York the brewing capital of the country in the 1800s sourced their hops in Alta Vista's Otsego County. Through this legacy, the New York State Farm Brewery legislation, and a desire to bring the farm back into operation, Conrad Fink decided to start growing hops. The first hop trellis was built in 2015, 125 years after New York's hop growing heyday.

At present, there are ten varieties of commercially developed hops under cultivation on 2.5 acres at Alta Vista Farm. Additionally, Conrad has propagated four wild, heritage hops that he discovered growing throughout Otsego and Schoharie counties.

Conrad joined the Board of the Hop Growers of New York Association in 2019 and has served as Treasurer since 2022. He joined the Otsego County Farm Bureau Board early in 2020 in order to use the strength of the organization to advocate on behalf of hop growers to legislators in Albany.

A life-long entrepreneur and business owner, Conrad is an enthusiastic supporter of brewers building their businesses and is dedicated to growing premium New York State hops for them. His brewery customers are located throughout Central New York, the Albany area, Brooklyn, Queens, and Northern New Jersey.

Conrad and Alta Vista Farm Hops are also the defending champion of the NYS Cascade cup!

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2023 HARVEST NOTES

The 2023 harvest saw some challenges as always. With less acres harvested than last year, and some definite early flooding issues, general yields were stagnant to slightly lower than the previous year. Downy mildew remained the main disease pressure, but pest pressure was reported to be less significant. Growers continued to report very good yields and performance of Vista and Triumph which seem to show a prominence in growing performance in many of the growing regions across New York State.

Experimental trials of USDA-EXP023 also have shown a great deal of promise in New York State, so be sure to connect with us if you would like an opportunity to become involved.

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BREEDING PROGRAM UPDATE


Our work with Cornell AgriTech and Larry Smart's office to breed commercially viable New York specific aromatic hop varieties continues to build strength. One current area of this program that can use your support is the provision of any male plant genetic material. If you discover any males hop



plants in the wild and would like to share, please let us know and we can connect you with Cornell.

The wild New York males can also be submitted to the USDA-ARS offices of hop breeding. Any males that have survived in the wild most likely will exhibit genetic traits of disease resistance that are crucial to breeding a New York variety that yields well and naturally disease and pest resistant.

So, if you know about any male plants, please reach out to participate and help us quote you for your service.

BEST PRACTICES

For new and experienced growers, disease identification in the field is a very important aspect of growing hops. Thankfully along with our partnership with Cornell AgriTech, the office of Frank Hay, plant pathologist, is here to help!

If you have any questions, or need help with verification please contact us. We can put you in touch with the plant pathology lab at Cornell AgriTech so that you can identify disease early and often. This will help with possible reduction of spraying costs, and will help prevent crop loss.
